## **New Youth Group in Husthwaite (and a new kitchen).**

At the village hall, the old billiard room is being given a make-over (to provide some extra storage space) and we're completely refurbishing the kitchen, replacing the units and the appliances. It's all being done with a grant from the Community Foundation and work should start on 14 April.

One of the main reasons for the work is to give us a new smaller meeting room, supported by better catering facilities, to enable us to revive opportunities for young people in the village (and from the area). The Village Hall Committee has made some good progress with this. We met with children and parents from the village on 15 March and, the following week, had an excellent meeting with Clare Yates. Clare works for North Yorkshire Youth, the organisation which supports the development of new youth groups in rural areas. She has proved to be a very useful contact, a good source of information about all the help available to us and some of the hurdles we have to clear to keep up with the law. She and her colleague were very enthusiastic about what we discussed and will help us make it happen.

So, to make a start, the VHC are happy to provide the hall on an agreed regular basis, sort out all the legal aspects and help with the financial issues. The most successful youth clubs are those driven by the young people, who take a lot of the responsibility for what happens. It is, however, essential to have parent support and an adult driving force within the community. What we need now is a voluntary youth leader from within the village or the parents (young people from other villages can join), plus a healthy rota of parents. This project is very close to fruition. All we need now is the right person at the helm. Please contact us if you are willing to help in any way, or to talk things through if you are unsure.

## Jowett Yorkshire's own car maker

I was reading a 1927 "Autocar" magazine article (don't ask) and the fuzzy photograph at the top showed an old Jowett 7hp car going up what turned out to be Sutton Bank. One thing led to another and I discovered that this was Jowett's regular test run, whenever they had a new car or modification to try out. Winter or summer, day and night, cars set out from Idle near Bradford

and went up and down as many vertical hills as they could cram into the eight hour run. Sutton Bank was the halfway point. And the same car did it three times a day!

The Jowett brothers made cars from 1905 to 1954. The cars and vans were strong, very reliable, different from everybody else's and very Yorkshire. People now still remember the Javelin, much ahead of its time, and the very long-running Bradford van, with its distinctive two-cylinder sound.

**Phill Green** worked for Jowetts in its later days, as an engineer in the experimental department, developing the Javelin and Jupiter. He did many of the marathon test drives, stopping in Easingwold to unfreeze himself. He's coming to talk to us at the village hall on **Saturday 2 May** about his experiences with this unique car maker. He will bring his Jupiter (one of the last cars they made) and we hope that other owners of classic Jowetts will be coming too. With luck, before the afternoon talk, there will be a chance to look at a few of these wonderful old cars, talk to their owners and have tea and cakes in the hall.

About the 1927 article; the writer was pleased that the car with its four passengers (and a very small engine) made it to the top. For the time, this was a serious achievement and, for years to come, helped the car to sell especially well in hilly Yorkshire.

## Free Adult Education In the Village Hall from September

Starting in September this year, two daytime adult education courses are being planned to take place in the Village Hall. The idea is that parents of children at Husthwaite and other local schools could attend while their children are at nursery or school. Anyone else who is interested who would like to come along is also very welcome, to join in meeting other people and making the sessions social and interesting occasions, as well as educational.

The courses follow two different strands:

One is for people who want to help in primary schools, perhaps with a view to, in the longer term, obtaining jobs as teaching assistants or teachers, or for those who just wish to know more about how to offer to help in their local school. This can lead on to a second accredited course for school-helpers.

The other course is for those who have been away from the workplace for some time, possibly caring for children or relatives, or have been made redundant, but who now would like to return to work in the future and would like to gain the confidence and know-how to apply for training, education or jobs.

We have two experienced tutors already lined up, and the courses are free. The courses are planned and funded by the WEA, the Workers Educational Association, who have a long and successful history of working in adult education in communities. We have the enthusiastic support of our local Husthwaite School head, Rebecca Bainbridge, to help us publicise the courses, for which we are very grateful.

If anyone is interested in finding out more, please contact me as I am working as the volunteer local co-ordinator on behalf of the WEA, and am helping to deliver these courses. ## Top Class Performers Make St Valentine's Day Special for Elphin Drift

On St Valentine's Day we had the broadest range of musical styles that Elphin Drift has showcased so far.

Top of the bill was **David Paynes** (see facing page). An 11-year-old Harrogate schoolboy, he was the youngest finalist in BBC Radio Two's Young Chorister of the Year 2008, and sang at St Paul's' Cathedral. In the packed village hall you could hear a pin drop as people held their breath in appreciation of the wonderful quality of his young voice.

**Rachel Dawick**, the New Zealand folk singer/songwriter, was with us again. We were part of her UK and European itinerary. Rachel sang some numbers from her latest CD, 'Journeys'. Her music has a haunting style, drawing on traditional ballads and contemporary Scottish/Irish melodies to give a lovely blend of her Celtic origins with the mountains and seascapes of her homeland. Google Rachel Dawick and you will be amazed that an artist with her CV should come to Husthwaite ... and enjoy herself!

Elphin Drift gave a warm welcome to the established acts who have supported us from the outset. **Phil Grainger** entranced the with-it generation and baffled the oldies with his multi-instrumental talents: guitar, keyboard, vocals, and percussion.

**Callum Watt** performed contemporary acoustic numbers (including his own compositions). **Long Walk to the Shore** descended with their atmospheric interpretation of folk, rock and blues standards. Their leader is **Alex Green** from Beacon Banks.

**"Stony Plain"**, who are forging quite a presence in the county, hit us with their traditional, uncompromising 1930s Mississippi Delta Blues. It was great to hear again young **Lucy Collins** from our own Low Street play her clarinet. Lucy has developed a lovely mellow tone.

We welcomed a newcomer, **Marty "The Picking Plumber"**, who introduced us to his collection of country songs played on mandolin and banjo.

**Mike Wells**, Husthwaite's professional sound engineer, broadcast the music. Everyone appreciates Mike's work, not least the visiting performers who invariably express their surprise at the quality of his sound production. **Alun Nixon** compered the evening. His fans were once again disappointed that in the interests of finishing at a reasonable hour Alun cut his own contribution. ## The Benedictine Sisters at Wass WI

Wass Village Hall was full on Thursday, 19th January. The occasion was the visit of four sisters from Stanbrook Abbey, at the invitation of Wass WI. soon to be our neighbours in their new monastery at Crief.

After a short WI business meeting, each sister spoke in turn about a different aspect of their life and work : the history of the Benedictine Order, ( which dates back to before the Dissolution of the Monasteries, in the sixteenth century ); the daily routine following the Rule of St Benedict ; and how they came to be moving from Stanbrook Abbey in Worcestershire to this part of North Yorkshire.

Their new home will be very different from Stanbrook, designed by Edward Pugin in the early nineteenth century. The new monastery will be modern, using some of the latest technology e.g. reed bed sewage treatment, rainwater harvesting, and a living sedum roof, triple skin walls and triple glazing.

Their community consists of 25 sisters aged between 30 and 91 years. They are an enclosed order which means they don't normally leave their monastery. Permission from the Abbess, Dame Andrea Savage, was granted for them to come and meet their neighbours in Wass at the kind invitation of the WI.

The sisters follow the Rule of St Benedict which means rising at 5am for reading and private prayer followed by first sung Office in the Chapel. The day ends with Compline at 8.15 pm. The community have the oldest private printing press in the country and have printed the works of distinguished literary figures. But their purpose in their lives is to give themselves to God, and come closer to God by prayer.

There were numerous questions from the large audience e.g. What is the difference between a convent and a monastery ? How do you support yourselves ? The sisters ended their presentation by issuing a general invitation that we visit them when they move into their as yet unfinished home in May.

To end this very interesting event, a magnificent WI feast of good food was set out, and enjoyed by all. The sisters did not eat but were at the centre of small groups of interested people, until it was time to end the evening Thank you, Wass WI.

*Dear Madam*

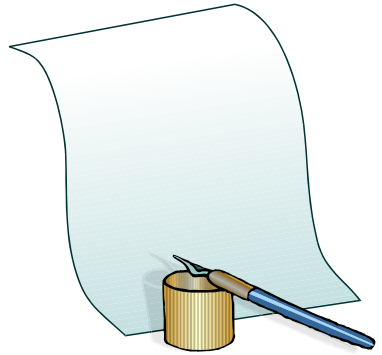

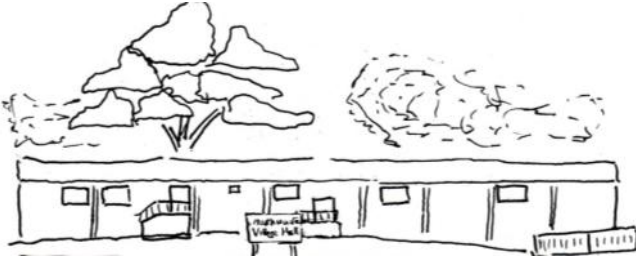
*I will end by saying it was very moving to receive such spontaneous help from your inhabitants.*

## The Orchard Project

The Orchard Project is off to a flying start. The 70 questionnaires and dozens of 1 to 1 interviews have resulted in a book “**The Fruits and Orchards of Husthwaite**” being completed and on sale at the village shop for £6 in book form or £3 as a DVD.

In terms of the tree planting , an orchard of 20 trees has been planted at the school and one of 12 trees in the paddock behind the pub. (See photo right of owner James Stephen-

*son with one of his new trees*). The funds are in place to purchase up to

250 additional trees in October for anyone who wishes to establish or renew a small orchard in their garden. The new play area will be completed by then and an estimated 30 trees will be planted in there.

A professor of pomology (yes this title really exists) will be visiting the village in May and September and he will be helping to identify old trees whose variety is at present uncertain or unknown.

\*Father Rainer to showcase his work at Ampleforth

\*Added to this 2-3 nurseries and Garden centres would have stalls and

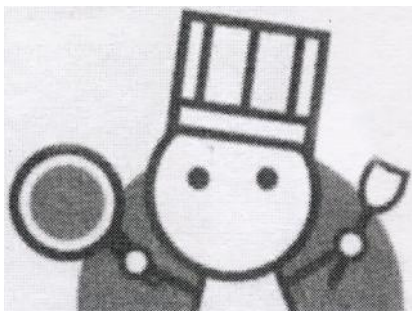
